#### **Bloom Festival**

ADAD's Bloom Festival explores and celebrates dance from Africa and its Diaspora through touring performances, workshops, films and discussions nationally across key arts venues. It is one of the only festivals of its kind in the UK.

#### **Trailblazers Fellowships**

Trailblazers is ADAD's annual professional development fellowship for dance artists, teachers, performers and researchers working within dance of the African Diaspora. Since it's inception in 2003, Trailblazers has developed 36 artists through providing a bursary of £2000 and a tailored programme of training. It's the only programme of its kind in the UK.

#### **Re:Generations International Conference**

The *Re:Generations* international conference is UK's largest gathering of dance artists, dance researchers, choreographers, teachers and students intending to shape future practice in dance from Africa and its Diaspora. The three day gathering includes presenting academic papers, discussions, performances and workshops from both national and international artists and academics to explore the practice and appreciation of dance of the African Diaspora.

### **The Heritage Project**

The ADAD *Heritage Project* is a touring photographic exhibition and book highlighting key achievements of dance artists of African and Caribbean descent in the UK from the 1930s-1990s. The exhibition has been shown in London, Birmingham, Leeds, Manchester and Bristol and has been accessed by over 10,000 members of the public. The publication, 'Voicing Black Dance: 1930's to 1990's – The British Experience', is distributed via ADAD's website and through universities.
